Keynote Presenters

Professor Irwin Epstein

Emeritus Professor (Retired)
City University of New York, United States of America

Work (Hunter College) where he occupied the Helen Rehr Chair of Applied Social Work Research until he retired in 2015. As Adjunct Professor in the Department of Community Medicine at Mt. Sinai, he conducted Practice-based Research Seminars for local allied health and visiting international health and mental health leaders for 20 years.

Before Hunter, Irwin was Professor at the University of Michigan. During his tenure there, he was a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Wales and Visiting Professor at the University of Warwick. He's

conducted practice-research workshops and mentored individual social work PhD students from Australia, Hong Kong, Israel, Singapore, UK and the USA.

At the University of Melbourne, he was the first American social researcher to be asked to deliver the Miegunyah (Ancestral Home) public lecture. Author and co-author of many research and nearly 100 peer-reviewed articles, his most recent research text was Clinical Data-Mining: Integrating Practice and Research, (Oxford University Press, 2010). During his career, his passion was teaching social work, allied health practitioners and doctoral students how to conduct meaningful research with routinely available qualitative and/or quantitative data. Retired in 2015, his passion became "partner-carer" to his wife Fran—a social worker at Mt Sinai for 25 years—but then facing her fourth and final cancer. Fran inspired his memoir about the value of male friendship, entitled Men as Friends: From Cicero to Svevo to Cataldo. It was published by Koehler & Co. in April. Fran passed in June. She was loved by everyone who met her as cancer patient, social worker and colleague at Mt Sinai.

Associate Professor Kate Thompson

Program Director Victorian Adolescent & Young Adult Cancer Service, Melbourne, Australia

Kate Thompson is the Program Director of the Victorian Adolescent & Young Adult Cancer Service and an Associate Professor at the University of Melbourne. A social worker by training, Kate is renowned for her clinical, research, and advocacy work in support of young people with cancer and the development of more responsive health services for them.

Clare O'Reilly

Director, Health & Healing, Victorian Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisation (VACCHO), Melbourne, Australia

Clare manages the Aboriginal Cancer Journey Strategy, Screening and Early Detection and Healthy Communities Programs. Clare has qualifications in Social Research, Program Management and Evaluation and has many years' experience in health. Clare has worked in the primary care sector and specialised in managing the development and delivery of

professional education, systems and tools to build capacity in primary care. Clare has managed many projects with the Victorian Aboriginal Community and in the last 11 years this work has been in cancer care.

Kim Hobbs

Senior Social Worker, Westmead Hospital, Sydney, Australia



Kim is an experienced oncology social worker who has worked for many years in the area of gynaecological cancer at Westmead Hospital. She has been involved in several collaborative research projects with academic partners, resulting in publications in peer-reviewed journals.

Kim has been involved with expert working groups through Cancer Australia, Cancer Council and Ovarian Cancer Australia. She has served on the OSWANZ committee, COSA Council and PoCoG Scientific Advisory Committee.

Megan Varlow Director, Cancer Control Policy Cancer Council Australia, Sydney, Australia



Megan Varlow is Cancer Council Australia's Director of Cancer

Control Policy, responsible for the development of national policy and advocacy for its implementation.

After training as a psychologist, Megan was endorsed in clinical and health psychology and spent ten years in clinical environments working mostly with people living with chronic diseases and serious mental illness. Frustrated by the systemic factors that confounded an individual's experience of chronic illness, Megan then worked in an academic clinical research unit and subsequently moved to NSW Health where she spent almost eight years at the Cancer Institute NSW, the NSW government's cancer control agency.

Megan is passionate about lessening the impact of cancer on all Australians; and is especially interested in reducing the inequalities in cancer outcomes experienced by people from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander, regional and remote, lower socio-economic and migrant communities. Megan is available for interview to discuss Cancer Council Australia's advocacy and policy priorities, informed financial consent, out-of-pocket costs, and the physical, emotional and financial impact of cancer.

Nick Hobbs VAD Navigator, Voluntary Assisted Dying Navigation Service: Tasmanian Health, Hobart,



Nick's current professional role is with the Tasmanian Health Service, Voluntary Assisted Dying Navigation Service. Prior to this Nick held roles as a social worker with the Grief and Loss Counselling Service at the Royal Hobart Hospital and the Tasmanian Coroner's Office.

Nick has also held social work roles in the Renal, Oncology and Palliative Care Units at the Royal Hobart Hospital and COVID-19 Hotel Quarantine. Nick is a past President of Oncology Social Work Australia New Zealand.

Professor Lynette Joubert

Department of Social Work, Melbourne School of Health Sciences, University of Melbourne, Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre, Melbourne, Australia

Prof Lynette Joubert is a professor in the Department of Social Work, School of Health Sciences, University of Melbourne. She is an honorary senior researcher at the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre, Docent at the University of Eastern Finland, and Chair of the STEMM2 Ethics Committee University of Melbourne. She has a strong interest in Practice Research, in particular, the contribution of social networks to effective outcomes, academic practitioner collaboration models and evidence implementation in health and social care services in the

community. This has resulted in her editorship of the first *International Practice Research Handbook* (2020)

Alison Hocking

Allied Health Service Development Officer, Royal Melbourne Hospital, Melbourne, Australia



Alison Hocking is Allied Health Service Development Officer at the Royal Melbourne Hospital (RMH), having previously been Manager of Social Work & Diversity at RMH, and Manager of Social Work at Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre before that. She has a Master of Advanced Social Work by Research, and her thesis focussed on the psychosocial impact of cervical cancer. Alison has published widely on hospital, social work and oncology topics with over 20 journal articles and book chapters. She is a current PhD Candidate at the University of Melbourne under Prof Lynette Joubert, with her thesis nested within a larger project that will undertake a national audit of hospital social work activity, focussing on how social work contributes to Health Equity. Alison was President of OSWA from 2013-2016.

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
